Judith Sutterlin, ABC Missionary, gives general oversight from the ABC side and is in contact with Ms Tan Hua and Dr. Yang (see below), who are involved in the direct oversight and administration of the funds. Judy visited all 10 of the Amity clinic doctors in June 2007 as the medicines purchased with part of the funds were being distributed. .

Ms. Tan Hua of the Amity Foundation provides the general administration of these funds for all of the clinics from the Nanjing office of the Amity Foundation.

Dr. Yang Wen, Coordinator in the Amity Project Office in Ningxia Health Department and associate professor in the field of medical examination of Ningxia Medical College, is in charge of the oversight of all projects related to the Amity village clinics in Ningxia Province, has direct responsibility for the local administration of the funds. She has made sure that the most appropriate medicines needed by those who cannot afford to pay for their treatment are provided and that these medicines are used in providing care for patients who truly cannot afford to pay for them. She is directly involved in each semi-annual (June/July and December) distribution of the medicines to the village doctors in the 10 Amity village clinics we are helping with this White Cross Project

The following 10 Amity trained village doctors are responsible for the use and dispensing of the distributed medicines in the care of patients from his or her village who cannot afford to pay for them.

- 6. Dr. Wang Sixian (The Jinhua Village Amity Clinic in Shatang Township in Longde County in Ningxia Autonomous Region in China)**
- 7. Dr. Sun Jinglin (The Dongzhuang Village Amity Clinic in Shatang Township in Longde County in Ningxia Autonomous Region in China)**
- 8. Dr. Han Hongxia (The Shibali Village Amity Clinic in Shatang Township in Longde County in Ningxia Autonomous Region in China)**

| _The village doctors are not M.D.'s by Western standards. They have received their training and are part-time doctors, while also often continuing to do his/her farm work to support his/her family. They are trained to provide vaccinations, health education and primary health care for the people in their villages. They are on-call 24 hours a day as needed. Each of the villages has just one village doctor, with the exception of Kanggou Village where the Amity clinic also has a second village doctor. | |

IMPACT RESULTS OF PROGRAM

Health Care Provided

(a) Illnesses treated include colds, flu, sore throats, coughs, bronchitis, pneumonia, gastroenteritis, indigestion, other digestive problems, gall bladder infection, bladder infection, kidney infection, other urological problems, inflammation of the pancreas, inflammation of the cervix, inflammation of the fallopian tubes, high blood pressure, low blood pressure, diarrhea, vitamin deficiency, toothache, etc.

(b) Prior to the provision of free medicines for villagers who could not afford to pay for them, those without the funds to pay for the medicines were afraid to come in to see the doctor. Even though they knew he/she would not charge them for the doctor visit and that he would lend them money for the medicines they needed, they feared they could never pay him/her back, so they often didn't come to the doctor when they should have. However, since we have been helping with these medicines for those in dire need, those who need to see the doctor are not so afraid to come to do so and are now receiving treatments to prevent any worsening of their various medical conditions, be they sort term or long term health problems.
